CHAIR'S FOREWORD

I am very proud to see the continuing development of our charity during this year. We have engaged with an amazing number of activities and consultations for such a small team of staff and trustees. Growing our governance base and skills set is a continuing target for us and my thanks to those joining us during this period for the voluntary time and skills they have contributed. We all appreciate our staff commitment and expertise and the support of our funders. Our thanks to them is unanimous. In 2018-2019 we were able to support more staff hours that are now continuing. We are currently developing our extension and support options to improve our facilities, our website and to increase our capacity for more visitors in the future.

I am pleased to recommend this report.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW: A TRUSTEE SUMMARY OF OUR PROGRESS

Creekside Education Trust continues to flourish with primary school education sessions oversubscribed and community low tide walks fully booked several months in advance.

Highlights of the year include starting our new secondary school sessions working closely with a local secondary school and using equipment funded by VINCI Foundation UK including iPads for data monitoring of aquatic species in Deptford Creek. The support of the Open University MAZI project has been invaluable to create the data monitoring systems for river measurements and river species. We will continue to develop our secondary school sessions next year to include GCSE field trips.

To support the increasing awareness of urban wildlife and conservation, the charity has been increasing our community engagement to work with local residents' associations and community groups such as Friends of Local Parks. This helps promote our principles of urban conservation including natural plant colonisation and management rather than planting schemes. In the long term this will extend the wildlife corridor locally and ensure invasive species are not inadvertently introduced through planting.

Creekside Education Trust continues to be supported by our donors. Particular thanks goes to long time supporters Thames Water and Deptford Challenge Trust. We were pleased to receive funding from Clifford Chance for the first time during this reporting period. We are also grateful to Tideway for sponsoring our new protective raincoats. Our education sessions, public low tide walks and ecology and conservation advice continues to provide a valuable independent and sustainable income.

Our charity is supported by a long-serving and engaged Board of Trustees who have an excellent understanding and experience of the local area, conservation and education. We expanding the skill profile of our Board of Trustees and invest in the governance structure. As part of our risk management Creekside Education Trust has devised a Trainee Trustee programme which allows for a full induction about our charity and allows a period of engagement between both Trainee Trustee and charity before the Trainee Trustee is asked to commit to joining our Board of Directors and taking full responsibility for due diligence and financial matters.

We are pleased to report that two new Trainee Trustees have joined our Board of Trustees. Owen Lysak joined our Board in January 2019 and is currently a partner at Clifford Chance. Bryan Hinshelwood joined our Board in May 2019 and is a Major Civil Engineering Projects Specialist with over 20 years' experience in large scale project including High Speed 1, London 2012 Olympics, Crossrail and HS2. No Directors (Trustees) have resigned from our Board during the reporting period.

We continue to work on our long term plans for a new classroom at Creekside Discovery Centre. Our education sessions are booked several months in advance, and in order to advance our secondary school programme and encourage more adult education, extra space and specialist equipment is required.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT CONSTITUTION

Creekside Education Trust Ltd. is a Company Limited by Guarantee and was created on 12th October 1999. The Company number is 3857829. It is governed by Memorandum and Articles of Association and became a registered charity, called The Creekside Education Trust, on 27th September 2000. The Charity Registration number is 1082622.

METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and coopted to conform to the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

POLICIES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

New trustees attend and complete the induction programme developed for staff and volunteers and are familiarised with how the activities are designed to deliver charity aims and objectives. They are termed Trainee Trustees until legally signed up as Directors of the Company.

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

The key management personnel of the charity report directly to the Board of Trustees. For this reporting period Sophie Amos is the Coordinator for the day-to-day running of the Creekside Education Trust and reports to the Trustees as a whole. From December 2017 Jill Goddard was appointed as Chair taking over from Ian Parkinson. From April 2018 Dr Ashok Sinha was appointed Treasurer.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed - in particular, those related to the operations and finances of the charity - and are satisfied that the systems and procedures are in place to mitigate the charity's exposure to the major risks. Cash flow and forward forecasting to the end of the financial year are reviewed at every trustee meeting and in between with the Treasurer. A budget for all charity costs is prepared every year to support the forward planning and is regularly reviewed.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Policies and objectives

The principal objective of the charity is to provide sustainable facilities at the Creekside Discovery Centre for the purpose of monitoring and maintaining Deptford Creek in respect of its fauna and flora thus advancing public education in environmental matters by providing safe and managed access to the Creek in combination with structured educational and recreational programmes for schools and the wider community.

Strategies for achieving objectives

The charity endeavours to create and operate an engaging range of educational programmes for all ages in order to meet its objectives. These are either run independently by the charity or in conjunction with third parties with whom the charity shares common aspirations. The programmes are promoted to the target audiences through a variety of outreach activities and subsequently assessed to ensure outcomes are being met.

The Trustees have prioritised key operations and activities which will ensure the continued success of the charity. These include a focus on supportive management structures, fundraising and the ambition to expand the current indoor facilities on site to increase booking potential and the financial sustainability of its services.

Activities for achieving objectives

The objectives are met via Creekside Discovery Centre's rolling programme of low tide walks, classroom studies, family activities, training programmes and interactions with related local and national organisations, including a paid advice service to new development companies planning to develop sites alongside Deptford Creek. Any income made is used to cover costs and reinvested into the charitable activities to sustain the charity development.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Key highlights:

- Working in partnership with the Open University MAZI project to create data monitoring systems using iPads in Deptford Creek for river measurements and river species which will be used by schools for scientific analysis.
- Working with Tideway on proposed works in Deptford Creek, and running public engagements to ensure understanding by the local community about what is happening with the Thames Tideway Tunnel including community liaison meetings held at Creekside Discovery Centre, and securing a corporate donation from Tideway to sponsor our new raincoats for walking in Deptford Creek
- Being the only London location to be featured in the Guardian photo series on high and low tides https://www.theguardian.com/environment/2018/sep/24/ebb-andflow-britains-tidal-coastline-in-pictures
- Having a fully booked primary school education programme and successful inroads made into secondary school education including 60 pupils visit pre-GCSE exams and 90 pupils who will be visiting for their GCSE field work research trip in July 2019 for data research on current and historic pollution in Deptford Creek
- Hosting Good Ship IKEA free four day event sponsored by IKEA for local community with over 300 children and families attending a plastics workshop and opportunity to drive a remote control giant IKEA bath boat toy that picked up litter from Deptford Creek.

Supporter community

Creekside Education Trust continues to be supported by our donors. We were delighted to have all of our key supporters and stakeholders at our 20th Anniversary Low Tide Walks on 31 May 2018, including representatives from London Community Fund and Deptford Challenge Trust. Other supporters included Thames Water, Tideway and National Grid.

A unique experience

Creekside Discovery Centre offers a unique outdoor experience in urban central London. Our aim is to be a voice for nature conservation and the biodiversity of Deptford Creek through a school education programme and community outreach for all ages. Our visitor footfall is currently just over 7,000 visitors a year.

We provide educational whole day visits for primary schools which compliment the national curriculum and promote learning outside the classroom through hands-on interaction with the natural world and local history. Sessions focus on scientific subjects and practical engagement. We are the only education centre in London with access to an inter-tidal creek – this means our sessions continue to be over-subscribed and booked up many months in advance. Currently schools from 12 London Boroughs come to our educational sessions. The schools are predominantly south of the Thames and mainly from the Borough of Lewisham and Royal Borough of Greenwich.

However our educational sessions are increasingly popular with schools from further afield including from Camden, Islington and Wandsworth Boroughs due to the unique opportunity to wade in a low tide creek in inner city London. Our team of experienced and friendly environmental teachers encourage curiosity, enthusiasm and excitement in the topics studied, the local area and the wider world with our education sessions lasting for over four hours, with the majority of that time spent with a specialist outdoor educator.

We protect local nature and wildlife through working proactively using the charity's expertise in influencing developments, projects and policies that can affect Deptford Creek's ecology. We provide ecological consultancy and developer advice on site specific wildlife habitat design, interpretation and site management. As Deptford Creek is an area of development intensification we believe it is timely to promote the principle of natural colonisation which is at the heart of our work on conservation. This also includes educating and involving adults in understanding local conservation, managing habitats and recording species.

1. Objective 1 Education and community engagement

1.1 School education

School Visits

In the current financial year (April 2018 - March 2019) Creekside Education Trust has facilitated 163 school visits and engaged with 5,210 school children and adults. We were delighted to host our first secondary school Deptford Green who attended for the first time – over 80 pupils came for a pre-GCSE river module refresher day. In the summer term we will be organising the GCSE field work trip for Deptford Green in Deptford Creek using equipment funded by the VINCI Foundation UK including iPads and other river data and collection equipment. Our primary school sessions continue to be over-subscribed. *Feedback from teachers:*

"Excellent all round, nice pace, engaging, brilliant calm manner with children - all were absorbed in learning throughout."

1.2 Low tide walks

Public low tide walks

Public low tide walks are geared towards adults and children aged nine years and above. As with school sessions, Creekside Education Trust aims to get local people out into nature to discover how fascinating and beautiful wildlife in London can be. The conservationist guide introduces participants to the Creek's flora and wild animals and facilitates discussion about improvements made to the Creek to ensure such biodiversity.

Over the past year we had 27 low tide walks which were well attended with 578 adults and children. The highlight had to be our free low tide evening walk on the 20th anniversary of our low tide walks for the local community with over 70 local residents attending. We always aim to offer free local talks and walks for the community whenever funding and resources permits.

Private low tide walks

Creekside Education Trust delivered a selection of nine private LTWs with participants including wades for special need, university and local community groups and ecology walks.

Feedback from low tide walk participants:

1.3 Activities for Children and Families

In 2018-2019 Creekside Discovery Centre facilitated 17 holiday activities with 636 participants attending. One of the key highlights was running a free activity for IKEA over the February half-term with over 300 local families attending.

1.3 Volunteering

Creekside Discovery Centre continues to be supported by our loyal and established group of volunteers. It would be impossible to run our community activities without their support. The regular weekly volunteers also contribute significant to our land and conservation

management ensuring that our site and Sue Godfrey Nature Park are flourishing with wildflowers and wildlife.

Objective 2 - Ecology and conservation

2.1 Ecology advice

We continue to provide local conservation expertise and are currently managing Sue Godfrey Nature Reserve on behalf of Lewisham Council. In the past year we have successful sown wildflower margins using seed collected from Creekside Discovery Centre wild flowers for a new development on Deptford Creek. We have also been providing ecology advice on terracing on Deptford Creek for other local developments. This includes advising on planting and landscape schemes (or creating appropriate conditions for natural colonisation), and technical advice on the height and materials for terrestrial terraces on the flood defence walls on Deptford Creek.

2.2 Conservation

The Creekside Discovery Centre site is managed for high diversity and is a refuge for many wild species. Our new free wildflower and wildlife walks have been popular with the local community wishing to learn about urban wildlife and wildflowers. We hope to continue these walks on a monthly basis and also work more with local Friends of Parks groups to encourage them to have a managed approach and to survey their sites first for wildflowers and wildlife before attempting new planting of wildflowers or other plants.

This year and in future years we will be working on our conservation principles with a long term aim of publishing an update and new edition to our landmark publication 'Deptford Creek - Surviving Regeneration' which was the history of 'the greening and cleaning' Deptford Creek project between 1996-2001 as well as the history of the local area. Surviving Regeneration was published in 1999, followed by "Life on the Edge" in 2002.

Finally our approach to conservation and land management is clearly working – on 8th May 2019, an incredibly rare species and on the red-list 'Small-flowered Catchfly' (Silene gallica) was found on our site in Deptford. By focusing on management - working with and for species already present and making opportunities for real wildflowers to colonise – we can enable all sorts of things to happen. Some totally unexpected – like the emergence of a cluster of 40 plants of Small-flowered Catchfly – a critically endangered wildflower in Zone 2 in inner London!

FINANCIAL REVIEW

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Board of Trustees has complied with the requirements of Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 and has referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing its aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE

Total income for the year was £127,094 (2018: £138,827) and expenditure for the year was £145,927 (2018: £172, 127). Depreciation of the Creekside Discovery Centre building accounts for £20,473 of the expenditure. There is a slight decrease in grant income due to some grants coming to an end. Our conservation income is up to due to advising on new developments in Deptford Creek. The decrease in expenditure was due to higher professional fees on our expansion project in the previous financial year. Net expenditure for the year was £18, 833 (2018: £33,300).

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees aim to create a reserve of funds which will cover at least six months of its core running costs. Any remaining general reserves are designated as a capital fund for the proposed extension and new classroom. Total reserves at the year-end were £263,043 (2018: £281,876) of which £17,215 were restricted (2018: £22,290) and £245,828 were unrestricted (2018: £259,586). The Creekside Discovery Centre is owned outright by the charity and forms part of our reserve cash and capital assets.

PRINCIPAL FUNDING

As Creekside Education Trust could not exist without these income streams, the Trustees would like to express their sincere gratitude to those organisations who continued to support the Trust during 2018-2019.

The charity is able to pay its debts and is operationally sound as a going concern. The Trustees remain confident of the future success of the charity dependent on the success of our fundraising activities and our financial contributions from other sources such as commercial partners, financial support through the local authorities as a by-product of commercial development in the locality. This is in recognition of our location in a high value but low amenity and open space area, and our income earning services.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Creekside Education Trust is funded solely via grants, sponsorships and other payments from third party organisations and visitors. The staff and Trustees work to secure these funding streams alongside the day-to-day running of the Trust.

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006. Creekside Education Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee registered in England with registration number 3857829. Its registered office address is Creekside Discovery Centre, 14 Creekside, Deptford, London, SE8 4SA. The accounts are presented in GBP rounded to £1.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

b) Reconciliation with previously Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (GAAP)

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 a restatement of comparative items was required. The transition date was 1 April 2014. The trustees believe that no such restatement is necessary.

c) Public benefit entity

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

d) Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

e) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

f) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

g) Fund accounting

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 March 2019

1 Accounting policies (continued)

h) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Costs of raising funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing third parties to make voluntary contributions to it, as well as the cost of any activities with a fundraising purpose
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of delivering services and other educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

i) Allocation of support costs

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function and overheads, are apportioned on the following basis which are an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

•	Cost of raising funds	3%
•	Education and Community	72%
•	Ecology and conservation	23%
•	Governance costs	2%

Governance costs are further allocated to Cost of raising funds, Education and Community and Ecology and Conservation at 5%, 80% and 15% respectively.

j) Operating leases

Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

k) Tangible fixed assets

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £100. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

The building was constructed with the help of capital grants from Veolia Environmental Trust and London Borough of Lewisham and is stated at cost.

Where fixed assets have been revalued, any excess between the revalued amount and the historic cost of the asset will be shown as a revaluation reserve in the balance sheet.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

•	Equipment			25% on cost
•	Building	•	•	4% on cost

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

m) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account. Cash balances exclude any funds held on behalf of service users.

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FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 March 2019

1 Accounting policies (continued)

n) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

o) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

p) Pensions

The charity does not operate its own pension scheme. Towards the year of the year it complied with auto-enrolement regulations. It makes monthly contributions to employee's defined contribution pension scheme with NEST. Annual pension contributions payable are charged to the income and expenditure account on an accrula basis.

Each year an amount equal to depreciation is written off from this fund to revenue. As a result, the Fund will be fully written off over the estimated useful life of the building which is 25 years. Given the age of the grant, it was confirmed in 2017–18 that all obligations for the award were met and the balance remaining at the year end was transferred at 31st March 2018 to designated Building Fund which has been created to reflect its non – liquid nature.
